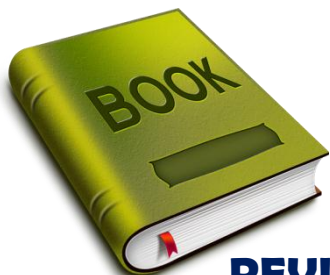

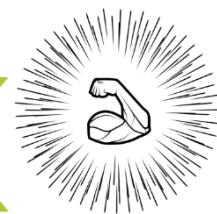

Civil Department - Brick bonding activity session was conducted for II Year B.E.Civil Engineering Students.

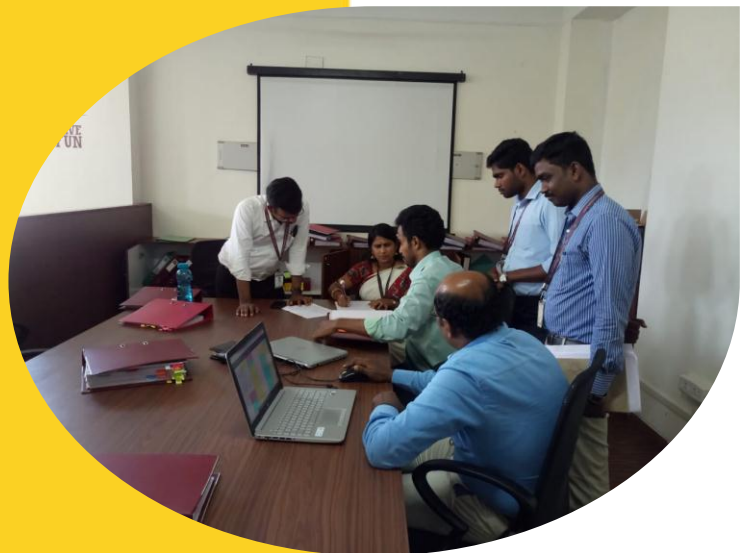


MEETINGS & DISCUSSIONS

CYBER ATTACK:

USA launches cyber attack on Iranian computer systems. The operation disabled Iranian computer systems that controlled Iran's rocket and missile launchers.

3 officials spoke on condition of anonymity because they were not authorized to speak publicly. They say President Donald Trump authorized the cyber strike even as he called off a conventional military response to Iran's downing of a U.S surveillance drone.

The officials say defense officials had prepared such a cyber response as a contingency plan for weeks preceding the attack. Cyber security firms say Iran has increased its offensive cyber attacks against the U.S government and critical infrastructure as tensions have grown between the two nations. Crowd Strike and Fire Eye, which regularly track such activity, say in recent weeks hackers believed to be working for the Iranian government have targeted U.S government agencies, as well as sectors of the economy, including oil and gas. The firms say the Hackers have sent waves of spear-phishing emails.

It is not known if the hackers managed to gain access to the targeted networks with the emails, which typically mimic legitimate emails but contain malicious software. The cyber offensive is the latest chapter in ongoing cyber operations between the U.S and Iran. The recent sharp increase is occurring after the Trump administration imposed sanctions on the Iranian petrochemical sector this month.

Update of DELL:

Dell releases update for a high-risk vulnerability in its pre-installed SupportAssist software and urges users who don't have auto updating enabled to upgrade the software manually. This major security flaw potentially effects millions of laptops.

Dell Support Assist software, which comes pre-installed on most Dell laptops and computers running Windows, has administrator-level access to the operating system(via a signal driver) because it must be able to identify issues, run diagnostics, driver-update scans, and install drivers. In May, Bill Demirkapi discovered a remote code execution vulnerability that can be triggered by tricking a victim user into downloading and executing arbitrary executables.

This new flaw(CVE-2019-12280) may allow a remote attacker to load an arbitrary unsigned DLL into a service that runs as SYSTEM, achieving privilege escalation and persistence.

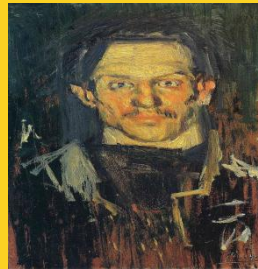

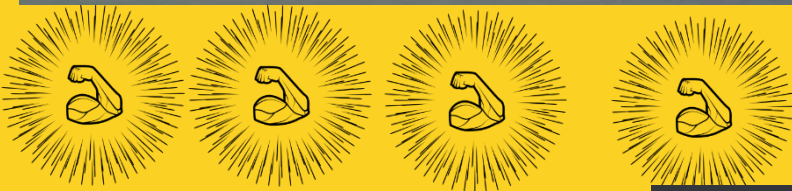

BE READY! FLOODS

DURING

- Unplug appliances to prevent electrical shock when power comes back on.
- Do NOT drive or walk across flooded roads. Cars and people can be swept away.
- Gather emergency supplies and follow local radio or TV updates.
- Recognize Flood Risk:
 - Identify flood-prone or landslide-prone areas near you.
 - Know your community's warning signals, evacuation routes, and emergency shelter locations.
 - Know flood evacuation routes near you.
- When power lines are down, water is in your home, or before you evacuate, TURN OFF gas, power, and water.
- Tie down or bring outdoor items inside.
- Throw away items that cannot be disinfected, like wall coverings, cloth, rugs, and drywall.

AFTER

- Practice Safe Hygiene:
 - Wash hands with soap and water to help prevent germs.
 - Listen for information from your local officials on how to safely use water to drink, cook, or clean.
- Use fans, air conditioning units, and dehumidifiers for drying.
- For cleanup, wear rubber boots and plastic gloves.
- Clean walls, hard floors, and other surfaces with soap and water. Use a mixture of 1 cup bleach and 1 gallon water to disinfect.
- Caution! Flood water may contain trash.

BOOK REVIEW

The Fourth Estate

Jeffrey Archer

Lubji Hoch breaks the bonds of his humble beginnings as the son of an illiterate Jewish peasant, escapes the Nazis, changes his name to Richard Armstrong, becomes a decorated officer in the British army, and ultimately finds himself in Berlin, where his sharp mind and killer instincts win him the opportunity to head up a floundering newspaper. As rival papers in the city fail in the wake of his ruthlessness, he nonetheless yearns to move on to even greater things.

On the other side of the world, in Australia, Keith Townsend, son of a millionaire newspaper owner, is being groomed to follow in his father's footsteps. Private schools, an Oxford degree, and a position at a London newspaper lead him up to the time of his father's death, when he takes over the family business. His energy and brilliant strategic thinking quickly make him the leading newspaper publisher in Australia. Yet he too longs to move on to the world stage.

As both Armstrong and Townsend seize control of everything they see, their ambitions collide on a global scale. But suddenly they both find themselves threatened by financial disaster and enormous debt. Frantic to save his crumbling empire, each man turns desperate. One's quest will lead to triumph, the other's will end in tragedy in this awesome tale of wealth and corruption, desire and destruction.

The Fourth Estate is the timely and compelling story of two men who, though they come from totally different backgrounds, stand face-to-face on the highest precipice, prepared to risk everything to beat each other and control the biggest media empire in the world.
